DISCOVER THE WONDERS





Eastern Turkey is the true cradle of civilization, encompassing the earliest farmers, the great Hittite and Urartian empires of antiquity, the conquering Romans, early Christian churches, and medieval fortresses. Bordering Georgia, Armenia, Iran, Iraq, and Syria, this seldom-visited region offers travelers simply incredible sights. See the earliest "temple" at Göbekli Tepe with its 12,000-year-old carvings. Visit Hittite sites with carved reliefs, and cuneiform inscriptions on the Urartian capital at Tushpa. Explore the Biblical connections of Urfa and Harran (where Abraham once lived), and Mount Ararat, claimed to be the final resting place of Noah's Ark. Eastern Turkey is a fantastic repository of ancient Roman, biblical, Seljuk, Armenian and Crusader relics. See the magnificent carvings in the Armenian Church on Akdamar Island in Lake Van, and an entire ghostly ruined Armenian city at Ani. And you will not forget the stunningly situated sculptured heads of Nemrut Dag, or Ishak Pasha Palace, the Taj Mahal of Turkey.

Tuesday, September 16 Arrive in Istanbul (TURKEY)



Upon arrival in Istanbul, meet and transfer to *Sultanhan Hotel or similar* for check-in and overnight.

Note: Standard check-in time is 3:00 pm. if you arrive on September 15 or early morning of September 16 an extra hotel night needs to be booked.

Wednesday, September 17 Istanbul - Trabzon



After breakfast, begin the day with a tour of the old city by visiting the **Archaeological Museum** and the Museum of the **Ancient Near East**. Continue to **Topkapi Palace** overlooking the Golden Horn then, transfer to the airport for our evening flight to the Black Sea coastal city of **Trabzon**, and upon arrival meet and transfer to *Grand Zorlu Hotel or similar for* check-in, dinner and overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Thursday, September 18 Trabzon



After breakfast, begin the city tour of Trabzon with a visit to the church of **Hagia Sophia** now converted to a mosque, beautifully situated in the western suburb outside the city walls and visit **Ataturk Villa** overlooking the Black Sea. In the afternoon, head to visit **Kuskoy village** via Gorele and Canakci town. Kuskoy means whistle language. The people in the village living upland pastoral life communicate with each other whistling. The village has been in **UNESCO List of Intangible Cultural Heritage**. Upon arrival, meet, interact with the locals, and be introduced to their way of life. After the visit, drive back to Trabzon and return to the *Hotel*, for dinner and overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Friday, September 19 Trabzon - Erzurum



After breakfast, head to visit **Sumela Monastery**, nestled in a breathtaking setting, and built on the face of a cliff. This splendid Christian complex dates back to the 4th

century AD and is decorated with frescoes reflecting the principles of the Byzantine liturgical art. Enjoy lunch, then transfer to *Zade Hotel or similar* in Erzurum for check-in, free afternoon at leisure, dinner and overnight at the *Hotel*. **(B,L,D)**

Saturday, September 20 Erzurum - Kars



After breakfast, begin the day touring **Erzurum** City, the largest city in eastern Anatolia, built on a high plateau at an altitude of approx. 6,000 feet. As we enter the city, the large Azizive monument commemorating the Turkish-Russian War will catch your eye. The city has an immensely rich past and a unique architectural style. The city walls and fortress are reminiscent of the period of Byzantine rule. Visit the **Great Mosque**, as well as the remaining **Seljuk buildings**; the **madrasa** is of particular importance (Double Minaret and Yakutiye) and other central sites including the **bazaar**. While wandering around the city, notice the local black stone (Erzurum **Oltu Tasi**), which is used in jewelry. Continue driving to Kars, stopping en route at the 13th century **Cobandede Bridge**, then continue up the Arras River valley, stopping briefly at the **First World War memorial** at Sarikamis. Upon arrival in Kars, transfer to Beylerbeyi Vilayetleri Hotel or similar for check-in, dinner and overnight. (B,L,D)

Sunday, September 21 Kars - Dogubeyazit



The city of Kars played an important role in Turkish history; it was at the center of the Turkish-Russian War. The Russian legacy can still be seen in much of the town's architecture. The lower city unfolds at the foot of an impressive Seljuk fortress from the 12th century. Begin the day with a visit to the **Archaeological Museum**, as it houses beautiful woodcarvings, an excellent collection of coins found in the surrounding region, as well as many ethnographic items relating to eastern Turkey. Visit the ghostly and picturesque **remains of Ani**, the capital of an

Armenian kingdom taken over by the Byzantines and sacked by the Mongols in the 13th century. Also, visit the majestic ruins of many **churches** and a **cathedral**, poetically dominate a grassy plateau on the Armenian border. Transfer to *Tehran Hotel or similar* in Dogubeyazit for check-in, dinner & overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Monday, September 22 <u>Dogu</u>beyazit - Van

After breakfast, begin the day with a visit to **Ishak Pasha Palace**, a spectacular complex, built in the 17th century with a mixture of architectural styles by Ishak Pasha, the Ottoman governor of the province. Get a glimpses of Turkey's most scenic natural monument, **Mt. Ararat** rising to a height of approx. 16,695 feet (weather permitting). Continue the drive to Van, stopping en route at the **falls** in Muradiye. Upon arrival in the beautiful city of **Van** on the lake, head to visit the 3,000-year-old **Citadel** and watch the sunset over the Lake, then transfer to *Ramada Wyndhan Hotel or similar* for check-in, dinner where we will enjoy their famous local fish and overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Tuesday, September 23 Van



Van is an important city set in a verdant oasis, at the foot of a rocky peak, on the shores of Lake Van, the largest lake in Turkey. Visit Tushpa, an imposing 9th century B.C. Urartian citadel overlooking the new and the old parts of town. Later we drive south along a branch of the Silk Road (Ipek Yol) to visit Hosap Castle. The main castle structure of Hosap, built straddling the Silk Road, served as both a mean of protecting the road and as a point of charging tolls to travelers. Drive to Gevas to visit Akdamar Island and see the beautifully restored 10th century **Armenian Church** of the Holy Cross, or Sourp Khach. If time permits, we may have the chance to be introduced to one of the most interesting weaving tradition kept by the women of Van. They still produce beautiful kilims woven in blue, red and white patterns. Return to the *Hotel* for dinner and overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Wednesday, September 24 Van - Mardin



After breakfast, begin the day with a drive to the **Mardin**, where we see many small towns that still have their own structure, see **Malabadi**, a splendid 11^{th} century bridge built by Seljuk Artukids on one of the tributaries of the Tigris River. Tour **Hasankeyf**, the Greek Kiphas, a city located along the Tigris River in Batman province, densely inhabited by Kurds. It is an ancient site dating

back 10,000 years. Transfer to *Gazi Konagi Hotel or similar* for check-in, dinner and overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Thursday, September 25 Mardin



After breakfast, head to visit an old **theological school**, **Sultan Isa Medrese**, with spectacular views over the barren desert. Continue to **Kasimiye Medrese** with its remarkable architecture and stonework. Later, visit some of the churches in the town and explore the shops along the main street. Drive outside Mardin to visit the **Saffron Monastery**, once it was the principal seat of the Syrian Patriarchy, and now is an active religious community standing on the site of an ancient Sun Temple, which dated back to 1,000 BC. it is an integral part of the current building's foundation. Return to the *Hotel* for dinner and overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Friday, September 26 Mardin - Diyarbakir



After breakfast, begin the drive to **Diyarbakir**, located at the shores of the Tigris River. The basalt walls of Diyarbakir, early Byzantine in origin, are more than 3 miles in length and have the distinction of being the longest city walls in the country. Visit the **Harput Gate**, and the **Ulu Mosque**, another fascinating sight in the city center and one of the oldest mosques in Turkey then transfer to *Dies Hotel or similar* for check in, dinner & overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Saturday, September 27 Diyarbakir - Nemrut Dag - Adiyaman



After breakfast, depart and cross the mighty Euphrates, arriving at **Nemrut National Park**. Climb to the top of Mt. Nemrut to see the **tumulus** and **colossal statue of Antiochus I of Commagene** and his gods. It is a steep climb, but you can hire one of the locals with their donkey to take you up a big part of the mountain. This ancient funerary monument at the peak of Mt. Nemrut was forgotten and lost for nearly 2,000 years to western travelers. Transfer to *Euphrat Hotel or similar* for checkin, dinner and overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Sunday, September 28 Adiyaman - Urfa



After breakfast, begin the day with a drive to **Urfa**, thought by the locals for thousands of years to be the birthplace of the Prophet Abraham. Upon arrival, head to the site **Gobekli Tepe**. This site represents a major shift in our understanding of man's early history. Here lie the remains of monumental megalithic structures dating to the Pre-Pottery Neolithic (ca, 9,600-8,200 BC). In the

afternoon, head to visit the **Archaeological Museum** and the stunning **Halebli Bahce Mosaics**. Then visit the **Abdurrahman Mosque**, and the **Pool of Abraham** containing sacred carp fish. Transfer to *El Ruha Hotel or similar* to check-in, dinner and overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Monday, September 29 Urfa - Gaziantep

After breakfast, begin the drive to **Harran** near the Syrian border, where Abraham is said to have spent a few years. Harran is also known for its beehive shaped mudbrick buildings. Continue the drive to **Halfeti**, the sunken city (with boat excursion on Euphrates), as a place where history lives, the ancient city of Halfeti was founded in the 9th century B.C. by the **Assyrian king Salmanassar** III and later hosted the Hittite, Persian, Macedonian and Seleucid civilizations. The historical richness of Halfeti also bears traces of the Abbasid, Umayyad, Seljuk, Zengi and Ayyubid cultures. Continue to Gaziantep, and upon arrival transfer to *Sirehan Hotel or similar* for check-in, dinner and overnight **(B,L,D)**

Tuesday, September 30 Gaziantep



After breakfast, head to visit the impressive **citadel of Gaziantep**, built in the early centuries of the Byzantine Empire and, later, rebuilt by the Armenian Kingdom of Cilicia, the Crusaders, the Mongols, and the Mamluks of Egypt. After lunch, head to visit **Zugma Musik Muzesi**, which is the largest Mosaic Museum in the world then have a walk in the **old quarter** of the city dotted with mosques and hammams and madrassas. Return to the *Hotel* for dinner and overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Wednesday, October 01 Gaziantep - Istanbul- US




Transfer to the airport for your flight to Istanbul and then transfer to your international terminal for your flight back to the US. **(B)**

You do have the option of staying with the vehicle if some sites seem difficult for you.
