



This tour through the Horn of Africa, named so for its protruding shape that resembles a horn, is Shangri-La for those who dare to break the mold of conventional travel and is undoubtedly the "road less traveled" for explorers.

Eritrea, on the shores of the Red Sea, has a history dating back to the Stone Age, but has only been internationally recognized since 1993 following a succession of wars with Ethiopia that spanned thirty years. The major highlight of Eritrea is the colorful diversity of the nine ethnic groups that live within. Asmara, the capital, proudly displays a shining collection of Art Deco, and other, architectural wonders. Massawa, a port city on the Red Sea, is the starting point for visits to the Dhalak Islands, one of the most unspoiled and least known reefs in the area.

Somaliland, while officially a part of Somalia, visitors are welcome here. In addition, it is home to one of the greatest treasures of the Horn of Africa: the 10,000-year-old Laas Geel cave paintings, which were discovered by a French archaeological team in 2002.

Djibouti draws few tourists thanks to its reputation for being the hottest place in Africa (probably true) and for being ridiculously overpriced (also probably true). However, with vistas that will take your breath away, a culture caught halfway between 20th-century France and modern-day Africa, and the opportunity to swim with whale sharks, the smallest country in the region is worth a visit.

Many of you have joined us on **Ethiopian** tours in previous years, but most likely, you have not visited Harar, a gem of a city in Eastern Ethiopia. Harar is a well-preserved walled city that stands to the east of the Great Rift Valley. It was founded between the 7th and 11th centuries and emerged as the center of Islamic culture and religion in the Horn of Africa. The city contains 99 mosques, including the 16th-century Grand Mosque, over 100 shrines, and a colorful, vibrant marketplace. This exciting adventure comes to an end in Addis Ababa, but not before a chance to witness the Timket Festival known as the feast of the Epiphany, arguably the most colorful festival in Africa. Come along as an observer to this remarkable event marked by spiritual processions and chanting.

Saturday, January 04 Arrive Asmara (ERITREA)

Upon arrival in **Asmara**, the capital city of Eritrea, meet the local representative and transfer to *Asmara Palace Hotel or similar* for check-in, dinner, and overnight. **(D)**

Note: Standard check-in time is 3:00 pm. If you arrive on January 03 or in the early morning of January 04, an extra Hotel night needs to be booked.

Sunday, January 05 Asmara - Keren (1 hr. 30 min.)



After breakfast, begin a scenic drive to **Keren**, which means "Highland" and is one of the major agricultural centers in Eritrea. The town stretches along a broad basin bordered by mountains on all sides. It serves as the capital of the Anseba region and is home to the Bilen ethnic group. Along the way, pass through interesting Tigrigna-speaking villages. Upon arrival in Keren, visit the WWII War Cemetery, which contains over 400 graves divided into Christian, Muslim, Sikh, and Jewish sections. Next, see the Mariam Da'arit shrine, one of Eritrea's most important religious sites. Thousands of people gather here every year on a pilgrimage. Transfer to *Sabrina Hotel or similar* for check-in, dinner, and overnight **(B,L,D)**

Monday, January 06 Keren - Asmara (1 hr. 30 min.)

Begin the day with a visit to the lively **weekly market** in Keren (open on Mondays only). This open-air market is a hive of activity and attracts traders and tribes from the surrounding areas. See a variety of goods, including fruits, vegetables, spices, souvenirs, and products made by local

artisans. There will be an opportunity to purchase items such as **baskets**, **pottery**, and **silver**. The market is a photographer's delight with the vibrant colors and enthusiasm in the bustling market. Also, witness the animated actions at the **camel** & **livestock market**, then drive back to Asmara and transfer to *Asmara Palace Hotel or similar* for check-in, dinner, and overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Tuesday, January 07 Asmara



At an elevation of around 7,628 feet, Asmara is the sixthhighest capital city in the world. This UNESCO World Heritage Site contains some fine examples of wellpreserved 20th-century Art Deco buildings. Enjoy a guided tour beginning with the early 20th century Asmara Cathedral, believed to be one of the finest Lombard Romanesque-style churches outside of Italy. Visit the Great Mosque, designed by Guido Ferrazza in the 1930s in a blend of Rationalist, Classical, and Islamic architectural styles. Not far is the Asmara Synagogue, the only surviving remnant of the Jewish community in Eritrea. Stop for lunch at a local restaurant and then visit the beautifully designed Enda Mariam Coptic Cathedral and St. Michael's Orthodox Church. There will be time to wander the old market, which dates back to the Italian colonial times. See the late 19th-century Governor's Palace, also known as Gibi, built in Italian art-deco style by Fernando Martini, the first Italian governor of Eritrea. Also, see the early 20th-century Post Office and Opera House, featuring Romanesque Revival and Neoclassicism architectural styles. Dinner will be at one of the restaurants in town, and then return to the *Hotel* for overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Wednesday, January 08 Asmara - Massawa (2hrs.)



Begin a breathtaking drive to Massawa, situated along the escarpment of the Rift Valley. Stop en route for a photo opportunity around Arbe-Robue and great views of the mountains, valleys, and the old railway. Upon arrival in **Massawa**, transfer to *Grand Dahlak Resort* by the seaside for check-in and lunch, then transfer by a private boat to one of the many islands in the Dahlak Archipelago. Snorkel amongst the beautiful unspoiled reefs and spend some time swimming and exploring the island before returning to the Resort for dinner and overnight. (B,L,D)

Thursday, January 09 Massawa - Asmara (2hrs.)



Begin the day with a walk through Massawa, a historical port town eradicated by the Ethiopian army in 1990. Its crumbling old buildings, palaces, mosques, ottoman, mansions, Italian villas, and marketplace will give off an eerie feel. Stroll along the famous port, then enjoy lunch at a local restaurant. We might be able to visit a nomadic **tribe** of Al-Rashavdeh if they are camping in the area. Drive back to Asmara and transfer to Asmara Palace Hotel or similar for check-in, dinner, and overnight. (B,L,D)

Friday, January 10 Asmara - Addis Ababa (ETHIOPIA)



After breakfast, transfer to the airport for our early afternoon flight to Addis Ababa, and upon arrival, meet drive and, transfer to the Jupiter Hotel or similar for checkin, dinner, and overnight. (B,D)

Saturday, January 11 Addis - Hargeisa (SOMALILAND)



In the early morning, transfer to the airport for our flight to Hargeisa. Upon arrival, transfer to Damal Hotel or similar for check-in, have lunch and begin a walking tour of the city. Walk through the Central Market to see how local money and gold are exchanged on the streets. Continue to the Civil War Memorial commemorating the War of Independence, then the **cattle market** that attracts people from the surrounding areas with their sheep, goats, camels, and cows. Return to the Hotel for dinner and overnight. (B,L,D)

Sunday, January 12 Hargeisa - Berbera (2 hrs. 15 min.)



Begin the day with a drive to the port town of **Berbera**, the former capital of Somaliland and capital of the British Protectorate. Stop en route to visit the Neolithic Laas Geel cave paintings, discovered by archaeologists in 2002, some of the paintings are between 5,000 to 10,000 years old. There are paintings of giraffes, dogs, and antelopes, as well as images of cattle in ceremonial garbs worshipped by men, who appear to be bowing before them. Pass by the Berbera Port, a former naval and missile base for the Somali government, then continue to Damal Hotel or *similar* for check-in, dinner, and overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Monday, January 13





After breakfast, take the scenic route back to Hargeisa, stopping near Sheikh town to explore the 16th-century ruins of Feruda. Once we arrive in Hargeisa, transfer to Damal Hotel or a similar hotel for check-in, dinner, and overnight. (B,L,D)

Tuesday, January 14



Hargeisa - Harar (ETHIOPIA) (5 hrs.)

Begin a long driving day to the historic walled city of Harar, considered the fourth holiest city of Islam with its colorful markets and some 99 mosques. Upon arrival, transfer to Ras Hotel or similar for check-in, and in the evening, meet with the famous hyena-feeding man for an up-close and personal encounter with these captivating animals. Return to the *Hotel* for dinner and overnight. (B,L,D)

Wednesday, January 15 Harar - Dire Dawa - Addis



After breakfast, begin the city tour with a visit to the former residence of the French Poet Arthur Rimbaud, Learn about his works and enjoy the view of Harar's markets, rooftops, and beyond through the colorful windows of the mansion. Also, visit the Harar Museum, which is housed in a traditional Harari home and contains traditional costumes. ancient manuscripts, religious texts, and household items of the Harari people. Transfer to the airport for our flight back to Addis Ababa, and upon arrival, meet & transfer to Jupiter Hotel or similar for check-in, dinner, and overnight. (B,L,D)

Thursday, January 16 Addis - Djibouti (DJIBOUTI)



Transfer early in the morning to the airport for our flight to the historic city of **Djibouti**. **Upon** arrival, transfer to *Escale* International Hotel or similar for check-in and have lunch. In the afternoon, head out on a city tour to explore Djibouti's markets, old French mansions, the Post Office, and the old railway station. Return to the Hotel for dinner and overnight. (B,L,D)

Friday, January 17



Djibouti (Lac Assal) (1 hr. 20 min.)

Enjoy breakfast, then head to the colorful Lac Assal, "The Sea of Honey." It lies at the bottom of a crater in Africa's lowest point and is the world's second saltiest body of water. Also, see the "New Crack," created by the new Rift formation. Enjoy a picnic lunch along the way and then return to the *Hotel* for a free afternoon at leisure, dinner, and overnight (B,L,D)

Saturday, January 18 Djibouti (Whale Shark Excursion)



After breakfast, depart from the Fishing Point to Ras **Korali** for the chance to encounter the giant **whale sharks**. Spend about an hour swimming and snorkeling with these gentle giants if you like, then enjoy lunch on the boat. Later

in the afternoon, return to the *Hotel* for dinner & overnight. **(B,L,D)**

NOTE: Be advised that there is no guarantee of sighting whale sharks, even during the peak season.

Sunday, January 19 Djibouti - Addis (Eve of Timket Festival)

Transfer in the morning to the airport for our flight back to **Addis Ababa**, and upon arrival, meet and transfer to *Jupiter Hotel* or similar for check-in and have lunch. In the afternoon, attend the first day **(Eve) of Timket Epiphany**, known as **Ketera**, commemorating the Baptism of Jesus Christ at the River Jordan by John the Baptist. On this day, the Tabots (replica of the Ark of the Covenant) are taken from the holiest of churches in Ethiopia and carried by the priests in a procession to a river or water reservoir joined by church members chanting hymns, dancing, beating drums, and blowing horns. The ceremonies continue throughout the night and into the morning when presunrise rituals occur. This unique and exquisite religious jubilation is an incredible spiritual experience. Return to the *Hotel* for dinner and overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Monday, January 20 Addis Ababa (Timket) - USA



Spend the day witnessing the **Timket festivities** and the Tabot being returned to the churches. After the holy ark has been safely returned to its dwelling, everyone goes home to feast. The *Hotel* will be available this afternoon to rest and freshen up until your evening transfer to the airport for your onward flight back to the US. **(B,L)**

Special tour remarks:

- Tourist infrastructure and facilities outside the cities are very limited & often quite primitive.
- Hotels may change at the last minute without prior notice due to reasons beyond our control.
- Air-conditioners in this part of the world do not cool a room to American standards of comfort.
- In the more remote areas, hotels may be basic with few amenities, poor service, and possible equipment failure such as no hot water, broken faucets, clogged drains, etc.
- Documentation of yellow fever immunization is required if coming from infected areas.
- Brownouts or blackouts may occur or there may be limited electricity available.
- This trip involves long drives in hot weather over poorly maintained and very bumpy roads. Those with bad spines, knees or other medical conditions may find the drives uncomfortable.
- There are a lack of modern medical facilities and chronic health problems should be discussed with your physician before joining this tour.
- A high level of flexibility, tolerance, respect, openmindedness, sense of adventure, and willingness to go with the flow if things change is expected while visiting these countries.
- We HIGHLY recommend traveling with only a carryon as the flights to Asmara are notorious for delaying or losing checked bags. If it is necessary to check a bag, be sure to pack a change of clothes, medications, and toiletries in the carry-on.

Trip Grade:
