




Kurdistan, the autonomous northern region of Iraq and predominantly inhabited by the Kurds, is amazingly different from the areas populated by the Arabs. The terrain is the stark opposite of the desert that characterizes middle and southern Iraq. It is an eclectic region that offers a multitude of experiences and chance encounters. Tour the world's oldest inhabited city with its antique museums. Visit monasteries and churches dating back from the 2nd to 4th centuries and the holiest sites of the Yezidis including the cave of the fire worshippers. Drive through breathtaking views of Kurdistan's mountains, rivers, and waterfalls. Explore former Jewish cities and other ancient locations such as Amadiya. Shop in the local bazaars for gold, silver, carpets, spices – you name it. From the great walled city of Erbil to nearly deserted, but still-functioning monasteries and gushing rivers like the Greater Zab and Lesser Zab that feed into the Tigris - the region has much to offer the seasoned traveler.

Friday, November 01 Arrive in Erbil (KURDISTAN)



Note: Standard check-in time is 3:00 pm. if you arrive on October 31 or early morning of November 01, an extra hotel night needs to be booked.

Saturday, November 02 Erbil - Duhok



After breakfast at the hotel's main restaurant, depart for **Gaugamela**, to the site of the famous battle between King Darius III and Alexander the Great. Then visit the 4th-century **Dayro d-Mor Matay Monastery** (St. Matthew's Monastery). This monastery is one of eastern Christendom's most famous sites and has been in continuous use for nearly 2,000 years, apart from a few forced closures. After lunch, head to Jirwan to see the oldest aq**ueduct and bridge** ruins in the world, built during the time of Sennacharib (690 BC). The site was once part of a vast complex that was built to water the gardens of Nineveh. Huge stones transported by hand from quarries many miles away are engraved with the story of this impressive feat. Discover the secret of the "hidden message of Sennacherib". Also, visit Lalish, the pilgrimage site of the Yezidis, descendants of the Zoroastrians and perhaps one of the most mysterious people in the world. Learn about the ancient rituals of those people considered by many to be the remnant of the original religion of Kurdistan. Transfer to Rixos Hotel or similar in Duhok for check-in, dinner, and overnight. (B,L,D)

Note: When visiting Lalish, shoes are not allowed; you should wear socks which your guide will provide if needed. Please note that while alcohol is served in the Rixos Hotel restaurants, guests are not allowed to bring their own bottles of alcohol into the hotel (small or large). Please leave them on the bus before entering

the hotel or ask your guide for assistance if you have any.

Sunday, November 03 Erbil



After breakfast, head to Al Qush and see the tomb of Nahum, the Old Testament Prophet (7th Century BC), which is situated next to the early Christian Mar Gorgis Monastery and Mar Mekha Churches, a 7th Century Monastery in the mountains above the tomb. Six hundred monks once inhabited the caves around the Monastery, and there is a Mongol cemetery across the valley where attackers were buried after one of many attempts to destroy the Monastery. Rabban Hormizd Monastery is an important site of the Chaldean Church. It is carved out of the mountains about two miles from Algosh, Iraq, 28 miles north of Mosul (ancient Nineveh prophesied against by Nahum). Founded about 640 A.D., the Monastery has been the official residence of the patriarchs of the Eliya line of the Church of the East from 1551 to the 18th century, and after the union with Rome in the early 19th century, it became a prominent monastery of the Chaldean Church (Eastern Rite Catholic). It is named after Rabban Hormizd, who founded it and is buried within the sanctuary. Time permitting, we may visit the nearby Al Qosh Museum and a local **Christian orphanage** run by Chaldean nuns. It is forbidden to adopt children in Iraq, and the extended family usually takes in orphaned Kurds. This particular orphanage is unique and provides a rare insight into the cultures and traditions of the region. Then continue to Dohuk and, if time permits, enjoy a scenic ride on the city's teleferic, referred to by locals as Buk u Zawa (the Bride and the Groom). Enjoy dinner at one of Dohuk's finest restaurants, then return to the *Hotel* for overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Monday, November 04 Duhok



A buffet breakfast will be served in the main restaurant at the Hotel, then start the day at one of the few Zoroastrian sites in the world-**Chwar, Stoon Cave**. Visit **Zakho** on the Turkish border and an ancient Roman bridge, as well as other features of this important trading city-once, a center of Judaism in Kurdistan. On our way back to Erbil, enjoy lunch and then head to visit the **Assyrian reliefs of Khanis** (part of the aqueduct of Sennacherib dating to the 8th Century BC). Return to the *Hotel* and enjoy dinner on the scenic rooftop restaurant of the Hotel or similar and overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Tuesday, November 05 Duhok - Amediya - Barzan



A buffet breakfast will be served in the main restaurant at the hotel, then depart for Amadiya, an ancient city dating back to the Assyrian era (700 BC). Located on a high promontory (4,600 ft.) above a breathtaking landscape and fed by a geothermal spring originating far below the mountain, Amadiya was once an almost impenetrable fortress. The City Gate (Bab Zebar), located on the city's eastern side, was built between 500-600 AD. Pass by the ruins of an ancient synagogue in this once-important Jewish center. Local traditions hold that the Magi (Three Wise Men) of Christmas fame began their journey from here. Continue through spectacular scenery to Rawanduz and stop briefly at Barzan to see the Barzan **Memorial** commemorating the genocide committed by Saddam against the Barzan tribe. Hear about Mullah Mustapha Barzani (the founder of modern Kurdistan and, if time permits, visit the nearby **memorial** to this important historical figure. Drive through the Soran District, located close to the borders of Iran, Iraq, and Turkey.

Enjoy lunch along the way at a traditional local eatery, then pass by **Shanidar Cave**, where some of the world's most important pre-historic remains were discovered, including the most famous Neanderthal, "**Nandy**." Learn how this 1955 discovery changed the thinking of many anthropologists about the nature of Neanderthals that lived here some 35,000 to 65,000 years ago. Time permitting, have an opportunity to climb the steps to the Cave itself if you want to. Enjoy dinner at the village of Rezan, Kurdistan's most famous fish restaurant (other dishes are also served), then transfer to *Rubar Resort* or similar located on the banks of the Great Zab River for check-in, where we will enjoy the resort's facilities and overnight. **(B,L,D)** *Note: Barzan is a "dry region," and alcohol is not served.*

Wednesday, November 06 Barzan - Rawanduz - Sulaymania



Begin the day with a drive to **Sulaymania** via the beautiful Lake of Dokan, the largest lake in Iraq, passing along

the incredible **Hamilton Road**, one of the great engineering feats of the past centuries. Alexander Hamilton cut a path from Shaqlawa to Iran against insurmountable odds. Walk along one of the oldest parts of Hamilton Road. Then head to see **Bekhal Waterfall** and enjoy a cup of tea or coffee. Stop for lunch at Kosraty Nwe Restaurant and enjoy the delicious local cuisine. In the late afternoon, time permitting, experience the sunset at **Goizha Mountain** overlooking the city of Sulaymania with a view of hundreds of miles on a clear day. Transfer to *Millennium Hotel or similar* for check-in, dinner, & overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Thursday, November 07 Sulaymania (Halabja)



Begin the day with a visit to the Red House (Amna Suraka), the site of many atrocities committed by Saddam Hussein at the former intelligence HQ and jail. Visit the Sulaymania Museum of Antiquities to view Kurdistan's largest collection of artifacts that date back thousands of years. We will arrange for you to meet with the museum's director (depending on availability), who will talk about how the home of irreplaceable treasures has withstood looting and war during Kurdistan's most chaotic times. Enjoy lunch at one of Sulaymania's fine local restaurants. (Due to Newroz, the museums may be closed, so we will proceed to Halabja and enjoy a picnic lunch in Byara. Continue to Halabja, where on March 16, 1988, Saddam Hussein ordered using chemical weapons to attack 24 villages in the Kurdish region beginning with Halabja. At least 5,000 people died as an immediate result of the chemical attack, and it is estimated that a further 10,000 people were injured or suffered long-term illness. Before the war ended, the Iraqis moved in on the ground and destroyed the town. In March 2010, the Iraqi High Criminal Court recognized the Halabja massacre as genocide. Saddam was executed for other crimes just before he was to be tried in Kurdistan for his acts of atrocity, and we will learn why. Today the city lives again - testimony to the Kurd's remarkable resilience and ability to survive the most brutal assault on their people and culture.

The Halabja Museum and Memorial Cemetery, which honors the thousands of people killed, is fascinating and moving. Visit Byara, which is on the Iraq/Iran border, and time permitting, stop at Ahmed Awa, famed for the three hikers who crossed into Iran from a nearby trail and were held in prison for several years. Return to Sulaymania, where time permitting, we can shop and wander its colorful bazaar, famous for its sweets, including the legendary "Manna," a chewy, white, nougat-like confection spiced with cardamom and nuts, and visit the small

but famous **Zamwa art gallery**. Return to the *Hotel* for dinner and overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Friday, November 08 Sulaymania - Erbil

Enjoy breakfast and then drive back to Erbil, stopping en route to see one of Kurdistan's most important historical sites, **Zarzi/Qizqapan Cave** (cave of the raper/abductor). The location encompasses two elements: one dating to 18,000-8000 BC and the other a Median-era tomb from around 500-300 BC. Continue to the old **Jewish city of Koysinjaq** (Koya) and visit an **old caravanserai** (hostel on the ancient Silk Road), which is currently being restored. Stop to take photos from a vantage point offering spectacular views for hundreds of miles in each direction. Enjoy lunch at a local restaurant that will be taken along the way. Transfer to *Ramada Hotel or similar* for check-in, dinner, and overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Saturday, November 09 Erhil



Enjoy breakfast, then begin the day with a tour of the 7,000-year-old Citadel of Erbil, the oldest continuously inhabited city on earth (there are other just cities as old but not continuously inhabited.) Erbil Citadel was once a Sumerian City called Urbellum or Arbella (4 gods), and it is believed that Abraham passed through this city on one of his journeys. It once housed the Temple of the Goddess Ishtar and was the city Darius III fled to after facing defeat by Alexander the Great on the nearby plains of Gaugamela. UNESCO is currently undertaking a massive restoration project. Tour the famous Textile Museum, housed in a 220-year-old residence featuring ancient Kurdish fighting tools, traditional dresses, handmade rugs from different regions and eras of Kurdish history, jewelry, and photos. In addition to Kurdish antiquities, there are several pieces from Iran and Turkey. If time permits, visit the local bazaar (Qaysari). Depending on the weather, we will picnic in the largest rose garden in the Middle East- the Sami Abul Rahman Park or a famed local eatery. The Park is one of the most revered sites in Kurdistan, housing a large memorial to over 60 of Kurdistan's leaders killed in an attack in 2004 (this included the man who built the Park, Sami Rahman, then Deputy Prime Minister).

Take a brief visit to the **Choli Minaret**, perhaps Erbil's most famous landmark (1190 - 1232 AD) and the site of a huge statue of Erbil's most renowned poet-Mudhafaria

(Mu-zaffar) Al-Din Abu Sa'eed Al-Kawkaboori, a contemporary of the famed warrior Saladin. Climb into the book he holds for a photo if you want to. Return to the Hotel to freshen up; then, we will be invited to a farewell dinner in a local home to dine and meet some of Kurdistan's residents, including some well-known cinematography, photography, and music. Return to the *Hotel* for overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Sunday, November 10 Erbil - USA



Enjoy breakfast in the morning, then transfer to the airport for your flight back to the US. **(B)**


- All transfers with assistance and luggage porterage.
