



Libya EXPLORE THE HIDDEN GEMS

October 12 - October 22, 2024 Led by Archaeologist and Former Director of ACOR Jordan, Dr. Barbara A. Porter, Libya is a country of stark contrasts, offering visitors an opportunity to see some of the world's greatest Roman and Greek cities and the spectacular Libyan Desert. On Libya's western Mediterranean coast, explore the charming Old Town in the country's capital city of Tripoli and admire the breathtaking ancient Roman city of Leptis Magna. Travel to the heartland of the Berber people in the Nafusa Mountains to see one of the world's greatest treasures, the Granary of Qasr al-Haj. Explore the unique whitewashed houses designed to keep the homes cool during the hot days and warm during the cold nights. Get a fascinating glimpse into the Berber culture and see how they live in traditional troglodyte caves. At the UNESCO World Heritage Site in Sabratha, you will discover Roman Ruins that date back to the second century AD. With Libya now allowing US Citizens to enter the country, now is the time to visit this stunning treasure.

Saturday, October 12 Arrive in Tripoli (LIBYA)

Upon arrival at the airport in **Tripoli**, a city founded in the 7th century BC by the Phoenicians, meet and transfer to *Victoria Hotel or similar* for check-in. After a short rest, meet your guide for a tour briefing, enjoy dinner and overnight at the *Hotel*. **(D)**

Sunday, October 13 Tripoli

Enjoy breakfast, and then begin the day with a visit to the Red Castel of Tripoli, located at the entrance of the Old Town. Excavation sites have found remains dating back to Roman times. It was built for King William the Lion in the late 12th century to repel Viking invasions to Lunan Bay. Spend time wandering the old town's narrow, whitewashed streets and ancient souks and admire its attractive architecture. Visit Al-Naqah Mosque "Camel Mosque" (if open), the oldest mosque in Tripoli and one of the oldest mosques. It was built before the construction of the Great Al-Azhar Mosque in Cairo; the colorful Turkish tilework of the historic 18th century Karamanli House built in the second half of the 18th century, during the reign of Ali Pasha Al-Qaramanli, and was used by Yousuf Pasha until his death. The house was restored in the early 1990s and became the Tripoli Historical Exhibition. Also, visit the British Consulate and the famous Othman Clock Tower in the heart of Tripoli in the Tal area founded by the Phoenicians, then known as Oea by the Romans. See the Arch of Marcus Aurelius, Tripoli's most impressive ancient monument. Explore Tripoli's Italian neighborhoods and admire its 20th-century Italian architectural heritage. Visit an old Christian Church and Tripoli's WWII Cemetery, the burial site of Allied soldiers. Enjoy dinner at a local restaurant and then return to the *Hotel* for overnight. (B,L,D)

Monday, October 14 Tripoli (Leptis Magna & Villa Sileen)

Begin the day exploring the spectacular ruins at Leptis Magna, one of the greatest ancient sites in the world. Originally a Phoenician trading port during the seventh century BC, it prospered for nearly 1,000 years before Vandal invasions and sandstorms led to its downfall. This vast city remained buried for some 1,300 years until the 1920's, when a significant excavation by Italian and Libyan archaeologists revealed the limestone and marble wonders that we will explore today. On the way back to Tripoli, stop at Villa Sileen (closed), which dates back to the Byzantine period and belongs to a wealthy Roman family. The villa, with its well-preserved wall frescos and intricate mosaic tiled floors, is a perfect example of what an ancient luxury seaside home would have looked like during this period. After dinner at a local restaurant, return to the Hotel for overnight. (B,L,D)

Tuesday, October 15

Tripoli - Jebel Nafusa - Ghadames (6 hrs. 45 min.)

Enjoy a long but rewarding driving day as we make our way south into the heart of Berber country to **Jebel Nafusa**, a mountain that rises abruptly from the desert plain of Jefara. The lush, fertile plains on the high plateau are full of olive, fig, fruit trees, as well as vineyards. You will visit the magnificent 12th-century fortified **Granary of Qasr al-Haj**, one of the World's 80 Greatest Treasures. This intriguing structure stores the harvests of the semi-nomadic people just as it has been for many centuries. Continue to **Ghadames**, the "Pearl of the Desert," a great example of a traditional settlement, and transfer to *Dar Ghadames Hotel or similar* for check-in, dinner, and overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Wednesday, October 16 Ghadames

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Spend the day visiting **Ghadames**, an ancient caravan center situated at the edge of the Sahara near the

borders of Algeria and Tunisia. This Berber town of unique architecture, palm groves, and gardens is an oasis that forms part of the sub-region of Gharian. It offers the traveler the warm hospitality of the Berber people and a unique perspective of day-to-day life that has not changed for centuries. We will discover unique homes built of mud, lime, and palm tree trunks in the Old Town, a UNESCO World Heritage Site. This unique design keeps the houses cool during hot days and warm during cold nights. In addition, the rooftops are all connected to allow the women to get around without being seen by men. Enjoy lunch at a traditionally decorated house, then head to the dunes by 4x4 vehicles for a beautiful view of the Sahara surrounding Ghadames and watch the spectacular sunset. Return to the *Hotel* for dinner and overnight. (B,L,D)

Thursday, October 17

Ghadames - Gharyan - Tripoli (7 hrs. 45 min.) Enjoy another long driving day back to Tripoli, stopping en route in Gharyan, a large village in the Nafusa Mountains, which is an excellent place to experience authentic Berber culture. You will discover spectacular troglodyte caves built by the Berbers to keep them cool during the hot summer months. Upon arrival in Tripoli, transfer to Victoria Hotel or similar for check-in, dinner, and overnight. (B,L,D)

Friday, Ocotber 18 Tripoli (Sabratha)

Begin the day with a drive west of Tripoli (45 miles) to Sabratha, a fantastic historical city from 500 BC. The Phoenicians used this UNESCO World Heritage Site as a port and trading post. Explore the Theatre, probably the most popular site in Sabratha, the Baths, Temples, and the spectacular theater, which housed up to 10,000 spectators. Return to the Hotel to freshen up and relax, spend more time in the **old town** with the guide to shop for souvenirs, or wander the maze of streets and alleyways in the Medina. Enjoy dinner at a local restaurant, then return to the Hotel for overnight. (B,L,D)

Saturday, October 19 Tripoli - Albayda



Morning transfer to the airport for our flight to Albayda, the capital city of the Green Mountain district, and upon arrival at Al Brag Airport, meet and transfer to the Hotel for check-in, then head to Soussa, a town and seaside resort and stands by the ruins of Apollonia, Cyrenaic (Apolonia), which was founded by Greek colonists in the 7th Century BC and was the harbor for Cyrene. After Alexander the Great conquered the Persians (331), Apollonia and Cyrene were part of the Ptolemaic Empire, founded by one of Alexander's generals, Ptolemy I Soter. The cities retained much of their autonomy because they were on the periphery.

Continue the drive to Ras Al Hilal, which means "the head of the crescent." It was the second port of Cyrene, known for its green shore, blue sea, and waterfall in the mountains. Return to the Hotel in Al Bayda for dinner and overnight.

Sunday, October 20 Albayda (Ptolemais & Qasr Libya)

Begin the day with a morning drive along the coastal road to Ptolemais, the former capital of Pentapolis. Named after Ptolemy III and originally a Hellenistic mercantile city, Ptolemais was founded during the 3rd century B.C. where its importance eventually increased following the acquisition of Cyrenaica by the Romans in 96 A.D. Ptolemais enjoyed the prosperity that characterized this era of the Roman Empire and as a result extensive public works programs were put into place for the upscale citizenry of this flourishing city. During the 3rd century A.D., following the decline of nearby Cyrene, Ptolemais became the region's capital city. Like Cyrene, it suffered the earthquake of 365 A.D., followed by a reconstruction period. In the 6th century A.D., Apollonia became the capital of Upper Libya when the water supply system of Ptolemais failed. Ptolemais' death knell tolled at the Arab conquest of Cyrenaica in the 7th century A.D. Continue through the pleasant Green Mountains to Qasr Libya, and visit a charming museum that houses more than 50 pieces of mosaic artifact fragments dating back to the 6th century A.D. The collection of mosaics is considered one of the world's finest and, intriguingly, depicts pagan subjects and human and animal figures. One panel depicts the Pharaoh Lighthouse, one of the World's Seven Wonders. Enjoy lunch, then return to the *Hotel* for free afternoon at leisure, dinner and overnight. (B,L,D)

Monday, October 21 Cyrene - Tripoli

The spectacular ruins of Cyrene are only partially excavated, and as we walk, we may discover a mosaic or statue appearing from beneath the sand. Starting from

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the top of the hills, we will visit the Agora quarter with the gymnasium, forum, Roman basilica, the Temple of Demetra, and Batthus Tomb. Following a narrow path, descend to the Temple of Apollo, the principal building of Cyrene. The temple was built as early as the 7th century B.C. and rebuilt three centuries later. Nearby lies the Fountain of Apollo, whose water was used for healing properties. The **Great Baths** are in exceptional condition, and inside the Grand Hall, the pipes carrying water from the Fountain of Apollo are still visible. The **Amphitheatre** is Roman, but its foundations and style are Greek. End the day with a visit to Cyrene Museum, which houses a beautiful collection of sculptures and statues, including statues of gods and goddesses, like Isis, Athena, Zeus, Apollo, Hermes, Demeter, Dionysus, and Cupid, portraits of Roman emperors and a bust of Alexander the Great, the marble group of the Three Graces, and the giant Sphinx as well as Libyan sculptures which differ in style and execution. After the visit, transfer to the airport for our flight to Tripoli and, upon arrival, meet and transfer to Victoria Hotel for check-in, dinner, and overnight. (B,L,D)

Tuesday, October 22


Tripoli - USA

About your Lecturer, Barbara A. Porter... Barbara led numerous archaeological tours from Algeria to Iran before her tenure in Jordan as Director of the American Center of Oriental Research (www.acorjordan.org) from 2006 to 2020. She received her A.B. from Bryn Mawr College and her M.A., M.Phil., and Ph.D. from Columbia University's Department of Art History & Archaeology. Her dissertation was on cylinder seals from Syria from

the Middle Bronze Age. From 1978 to 1983, she was on the curatorial staff and from 1983 to 1986, she was Assistant

Curator of Ancient Near Eastern Art in that New York museum where she later also lectured frequently in the galleries. In the 1990s, she taught in the Art History Department of New York University. Her interest in the Middle East stems from growing up in Lebanon from 1965 to 1970. In the 1980s, she participated in two seasons of excavation in northeastern Syria at the site of Tell Leilan and previously worked on archeological projects in Austria, England, Italy, and Jordan.
