



Malawi, also affectionately known as "the warm heart of Africa," may be small in size but is large in diversity. Lake Malawi, the third largest lake in Africa, offers remote islands, picturesque shorelines, and stunning sunrises and sunsets. The mountainous grasslands of Mulanje, Nyika, and Zomba plateaus afford spectacular photo options, and game-rich national parks and wildlife reserves provide exceptional wildlife viewing equal to those in East Africa. Malawi's greatest asset is her people – always ready for a laugh, a little chat, and an impromptu song and dance. Malawians' easy-going and warm nature makes this country one of the safest and most enjoyable places to travel in Africa.

Zimbabwe is well known for its amazing wildlife, but few know about its impressive ancient ruins or well-preserved cave art. This tour focuses on the historical and cultural side of Zimbabwe. Explore the Great Zimbabwe ruins, the largest and most significant stone archaeological complex in sub-Sahara Africa, thought to date back to the 11th century. It was built by the Karanga, ancestors of the Shona tribes, and for unknown reasons, the city was abandoned when the Portuguese arrived in 1552. Another fascinating highlight is the ancient cave paintings at Matobo Hills, home to some of the world's most extraordinary prehistoric bushman artwork. Some of the paintings feature wildlife such as giraffes, lions, and rhinos as well as humans, date back to 13,000 years.

Sunday, May 11 **Arrive in Lilongwe (MALAWI)**



Upon arrival in **Lilongwe**, meet the local representative and transfer to *Kumbali Country Lodge*, a private lodge on a 1600-acre forest reserve for check-in and overnight. Note: Standard check-in time is 3:00 pm. If you arrive on May 10 or in the early morning of May 11, an extra hotel night needs to be booked.

Monday, May 12 Lilongwe



Spend the morning participating in the various activities offered at the Lodge such as a visit to cultural sites, enjoying nature walks, biking, birdwatching, or touring a banana or coffee plantation. For a more leisurely experience, relax by the pool or take advantage of the spa treatments offered at the *Lodge*. In the afternoon, head to visit the **Dedza Pottery shop**, founded by famous pottery maker Christopher Stevens in 1987. The center has a training program teaching pottery-making that plays a vital role in the welfare of the local communities. Enjoy a welcome group dinner & overnight at the Lodge. (B,D)

Tuesday, May 13 **Lilongwe - Liwonde National Park (4 hrs.)**



After breakfast, travel south to Liwonde National Park, founded in 1973 for wildlife conservation. This park has an electric fence around its 220-square-mile perimeter to ease conflicts between locals and wildlife and reduce poaching. Within the park there is an abundance of wildlife including baboons, elephants, black rhinos, hippos, antelopes, and warthogs. Cheetahs, wild dogs, and lions were recently re-introduced into the park. Liwonde is home to almost 400 bird species, including the threatened Lilian's lovebird and brown-breasted barbet, the only place in Malawi where these birds can be found. Check-in at Mvuu Camp or similar, which overlooks a broad stretch of the **Shire River** in Liwonde National Park. Enjoy dinner under the stars in a especially constructed boma (enclosure) and overnight at the *Camp*. **(B,L,D)**

Wednesday-Thursday, May 14-15 Liwonde National Park



Spend the next two days participating in fun and exciting activities, such as **nature walks**, **classic game drives**, or animal tracking on foot. A river safari provides excellent **birding** opportunities and is a great way to see the wildlife from a different perspective. The guides are incredible birding experts who recognize bird calls, and the professional trackers will know where the cheetah cubs are hiding. Dinners & overnights at the Camp. (B,L,D)

Friday, May 16



Liwonde National Park - Nankhoma Island 🕮 💳 Begin the day with a drive to Nankhoma Island at Lake **Malawi National Park**, the first freshwater national park to be declared a UNESCO World Heritage site worldwide. This status protects the diversity of the endemic fish and aquatic habitats including over 600 species of Cichlid and other species of fish not found anywhere else on earth. The transparent waters of **Lake Malawi** are a sanctuary for the birdlife - from the darting cormorant to the regal fish eagle. Transfer to Blue Zebra Island Lodge (luxury tents) or similar for check-in and have some rest. The Lodge is located on the private island of **Nankoma**, a stunning piece of paradise on the southern edge of Lake Malawi National Park. The island is teaming with wildlife such as antelopes, tortoises, chameleons, monitor lizards, and otters. Dinner and overnight at the Lodge. (B,L,D)

Saturday, May 17 Nankhoma Island



Spend the day participating in activities of choice such as **hiking** the nature trails to spot wildlife and take in the panoramic views or kayaking around islands. Other activities include scuba diving or snorkeling or participating in one of the many water sports available such as wakeboarding, waterskiing, or tubing. Dinner and overnight at the Lodge. (B,L,D)

Note: Motorized water sports are at an additional cost.

Sunday, May 18

Nankhoma Island - Lilongwe (2 hrs. 15 min.)



Begin the drive back to **Lilongwe** and head to visit **Mua Mission**, well known for its high quality woodcarving produced & sold. Missionary Fr. Claude Boucher Chisale established this Culture and Art Center in 1976 to aid in preserving Malawian culture. Learn about the history and culture of Malawi, particularly the Chewa, Ngoni, and Yao, and admire the Gule Wamkula masks on display at the **museum**. Transfer to *Kumbali Country Lodge or similar* for check-in, dinner & overnight. **(B,D)**

Monday, May 19 Lilongwe - Harare (ZIMBABWE)



After breakfast, transfer to the airport for our morning flight to the capital city of **Harare**. After a light lunch at a local café, transfer to the charming *Highlands House or similar* for check-in, the rest of the day free at leisure and overnight. **(B,L)**

Tuesday, May 20

Harare - Great Zimbabwe (5 hrs.)

The highlight of any visit to Zimbabwe is the ancient city of **Great Zimbabwe**. Begin the drive to the ancient city and upon arrival, transfer to the *Lodge* for check-in, an excellent place to take a step back to the era of the Kingdom of Zimbabwe. The *Lodge* is built atop a granite outcrop with sweeping views of a tree-filled valley facing the direction of Great Zimbabwe. The rest of the afternoon will be free afternoon at leisure to enjoy the firelight and soft mbira music. Dinner and overnight at the *Lodge*. **(B,L,D)**

Wednesday, May 21 Great Zimbabwe Ruins



Once the capital of Zimbabwe, **Great Zimbabwe** is the largest and most significant stone archaeological complex in sub-Sahara Africa. It is also one of the oldest, thought to date back to the 11th century, only second to South Africa's **Mapungwe**. Composed entirely of rectangular granite blocks stacked on top of one another without using mortar, the walls and towers of this World Heritage Site measure up to 40 feet high in sections. The ancient City was built and occupied between the 12th & 15th centuries by the Karenga, ancestors of the Shona tribes, who constitute much of the population of Zimbabwe today. For unknown reasons, the city was abandoned when the Portuguese arrived in 1552. Spend the day exploring this incredible site, then return to the *Lodge* for a free afternoon at leisure, dinner, & overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Thursday, May 22

After breakfast, begin the journey west towards spectacular Matobo Hills, known for its rich cultural history, diverse flora and fauna, and magnificent rugged terrain. Its unspoiled wilderness features red-tinged granite boulders and wooded valleys, making it a dream destination for nature enthusiasts and hikers. Matobo National Park is home to an impressive range of African wildlife, including the highly endangered black and white rhino, and has one of the highest concentrations of

leopards and black eagles in Africa. Ancient people have found shelter in the caves of Matobo Hills, leaving behind a legacy of rock art featuring some of the world's best-preserved San Bushman rock art paintings. Upon arrival, transfer to *Amalinda Lodge or similar*, an amazing thatched-roof home-turned-lodge for check-in, dinner, and overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Friday, May 23

Matobo Hills (Ancient Rock Art)



Spend the day exploring **Matobo Hills** and its impressive ancient rock art, mostly depicting human figures and animals such as giraffes, zebras, ostriches, monkeys, and rhinos. The paintings are illustrated using various colors, including reds, purples, oranges, browns, yellows, blacks, and greys. Visit the World's View **Whaleback Granite Rock** and the **Grave of Cecil John Rhodes**, both ideal places to enjoy a refreshing drink and the sunset after exploring this beautiful park. Return to the *Lodge* for dinner and overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Saturday, May 24

Matobo Hills (Cultural Village)



Today will be an excellent opportunity to learn about **Matabele culture**. Appreciate their gracious hospitality as they show us around their "pole and dagga" homesteads. Visit the local clinic and primary school and meet its traditional healer for a fascinating insight into their lives. Learn about traditional hut painting and Mother Africa Trust, established in 2006 during a dark period in Zimbabwe's most recent history. Return to the *Lodge* for dinner and overnight. **(B,L,D)**

Sunday, May 25

Matobo - Bulawayo - USA

OR continue to MOZAMBIQUE



After breakfast, transfer to the airport for your flight back to the US. **(B)**

OR join us on the exciting journey to **Mozambique**, **Eswatini**, & **Lesotho**.
